Increases in Mental Health Challenges

Opioid-involved overdose deaths <u>quadrupled</u> between 2010 – 2021

 National Institute on Drug Abuse Over past twenty years, suicide rates in the U.S. <u>increased by 35%</u>





Children's mental health



- Based on survey of 1,200 California middle school students between April 2020 and March 2021
 - 63% of students reported having an emotional meltdown
 - 43% had panic or anxiety attach
 - 19% described having suicidal thoughts

Care First Training



- Trauma informed training is provided to all LA County Parks recreation staff as part of their professional development
- Trauma Informed Care is also a lens for developing programming







Parks Programs for Mental Health Awareness Month

- Parks at Sunset programming in the month of May include recreation activity to promote mental health wellness
 - Events promote self-care, connection, physical wellbeing and community
 - Events are family friendly, free, or low cost
- Programming is done in partnership with Department of Mental Health

LA County Parks New Safety Ordinance

- LA County Parks New Safety Ordinance Approved by Board of Supervisors December 2023
- Safety ordinance grants authority to the Director and/or designees to exclude a person from the park for a set period
 - Warning is required before issuing a removal or exclusion order unless the behavior or conduct involves certain type of conduct, such as dangerous or threatening behavior
 - o Exclusion may cover one park or multiple locations

Exclusion Period for Non-Serious Offenses		
Prior Offense	Exclusion Period	
First	30 days	
Second	90 days	
Third +	180 days	

Exclusion Period for Serious Offenses*		
Prior Offense	Longer Exclusion Period	
First	60 days	
Second	120 days	
Third +	270 days	
* Felonies; property damage of \$1,000 or more; dangerous or threatening behavior.

Los Angeles City Administrative Code



"The Public Welfare and Shelter Division shall be under and subject to the control of the Department of Recreation and Parks of the City of Los Angeles. The Chief of this division shall be the General Manager of the Department. The chief shall be responsible for arranging, directing and coordinating sheltering services for persons rendered homeless as a result of a local emergency."



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
