








### BRICKLINE GREENWAY TIMELINE

### **Chainbreaker**


- Founded in 2004 in Santa Fe, NM

- Renters, low-income homeowners & BIPOC






#### **A Cycle of Poverty and Pollution**




Cycle of Poverty Diagram




